#### M's Action Diary for April

- Lightly cut back alpines such as arabis and aubretia to shape them and promote new growth.
- Keep newly planted trees, shrubs and plants well-watered until established.
- Clip winter-flowering heathers with shears to remove faded flowers and retain shape.
- Stake tall growing perennials before they actually need it.
- Give sedums, phlox and campanula lactiflora the "Chelsea Chop" by cutting back some or all of the growth by a third for shorter, stronger, later flowering growth.
- Hard prune doronicums and pulmonarias to remove shoots prone to mildew, encouraging new growth from the base.
- Keep checking for lily beetles and vine weevils, and remove.
- Keep feeding birds (but not peanuts which can choke fledglings) and provide water.

### Green Gardening Tip

Not all weeds are bad! Some attract pollinators and others can improve the soil. And most can be composted, which will add nutrients to your soil. To use toxic chemicals to obliterate them is simply not necessary. Persistent weeds such as bindweed and ground elder have to be dug over regularly, removing as much root as possible. Knowing about a weed's habit, biology, persistence and spread will help you to keep on top of it. Garden Organic have detailed information on more than 100 individual weeds, from dandelion to creeping buttercup, bindweed and ground elder.
